One of the highlights of 2011 was the salvation of a 93 year-old cowboy, to whom we had witnessed to many times. Finally, after a ranch trip visit with John, he made the choice to give his life to Christ!



An important accomplishment in 2011 was the producing and distribution of the Shantyman magazine. Approximately 4000 magazines went out to reserves in the interior of BC, as well as to ranches and rodeos. John traveled out to one of the large ranches and met five cowboys riding the range. When he offered a magazine to one, the fellow said he had picked it up in town already (at the rodeo parade probably where 1600 had gone out). We hope to visit some of these ranches and also the reserves in the summer of 2012, with cowboy evangelist and singer Herb and Crystal Taylor.

An independently produced radio program for natives was presented every Sunday morning on three stations with a potential of 20,000 listeners; sponsored and paid for by this ministry. The best response we could ascertain for this was the occasional word of mouth that people enjoyed listening to it. We add to it some good country gospel music and an invitation to contact us for further discussion.

We flew out to visit people in the ranch country by use of a Cessna aircraft. We continued to re-fabricate the supercub bush plane through the help of a supporting church.



Our kids have developed a musical ministry serving at senior's events, church conferences, coffee houses, at SCA BMC and this year on our Christmas radio program. We feel extremely blessed in this.

Once again we held a boy's horse ride weekend and eight boys participated. It is an excellent time for spiritual and character growth for the boys. We are already in the planning stages for another one.



Cynthia led a VBS in our home which was well attended by the local children. There were about 18 people involved and happily some salvations experienced.

The rodeos are always a highlight. In the first rodeo we were blessed by the music of Kevin and Kim Elias from the Native Gospel Band called The Singing Hills. A native man gave his life to Christ at that cowboy church and insisted on doing one in his own native tongue with the pastor who had spoken, cowboy preacher and native missionary, Steve Horsman. Again at the Williams Lake Stampede about 900 people attended while the phenomenal singers, The Daae Family from Saskatchewan ministered. Though it really rained, we all felt the presence of the Lord in directing that outreach.



Some good time was spent in the north ministering with the Blueberry Ministry Centre Staff, as well as visiting isolated ranches, oil and logging camps, and native reserves.

We thank the Lord for the support of the churches and individuals who make this ministry possible.
